Developing Trauma-Informed Clinical and Educational Programming for High-Risk Urban Youth in Schools," training aims to equip educational leaders with the knowledge and skills necessary to transform K-12 alternative schools into nurturing environments for students impacted by trauma. The presenters will outline a collaborative and comprehensive approach, beginning with an introduction to the concept of trauma and its prevalence in high-risk urban educational settings; setting the stage for a deeper understanding of the student profile typical of such environments, which has been compounded by challenges like COVID-19.

This training delves into SAMHSA's six key principles of trauma-informed education—safety, trustworthiness, collaboration, empowerment, and cultural competence—to foster supportive educational settings. It combines theoretical insights and practical guidance to help educational leaders cultivate a trauma-informed school culture, emphasizing the roles of educators, clinicians, and the engagement of families. Featuring interactive elements like case studies and the "Looking Through Your Trauma Lens" activity, the training equips leaders to implement these practices effectively, addressing potential challenges and promoting active participation through a Q&A session. Central to the training is the promotion of a collaborative approach among all stakeholders, aiming to build a sustainable support model for the holistic well-being and success of high-risk students.

As a nationally recognized institution, Summit Academy prioritizes addressing the social and emotional needs of its students, resulting in improved attendance and academic achievement. Central to this success is the implementation of a comprehensive approach where students have a sense of autonomy, belonging, and competence. Through these, Summit Academy has developed systems for both students and staff, leading to a consistent increase in student engagement with their personal learning experiences year after year.

This presentation aims to introduce attendees to proven strategies that can be readily implemented, requiring minimal to no financial investment. These strategies have demonstrated significant efficacy in fostering a school culture and environment wherein students actively desire to participate in their educational journey. Students that feel a strong sense of autonomy, belonging, and competence are more intrinsically motivated to be the best version of themselves.

Indicators of Success: Enhanced Understanding of Autonomy, Belonging, and Competence: Attendees will have an improved understanding of the importance of autonomy, belonging, and competence in fostering a supportive learning environment.

Implementation of Proven Strategies: Attendees will leave with several strategies they can implement in their program or schools they support.

We created a "Stay Interview" that provides a significant amount of information to learn why teachers are staying. This interview identifies areas of culture that are both positive and negative.

Maximizing Student Engagement for Alternative High School Students and Autistic Students

Alternative high school students who are emotionally engaged in their school and classroom have been found to be more likely to complete high school and earn a diploma. Furthermore, autistic students who are actively engaged in rigorous and appropriate academic or functional learning have lower instances of maladaptive behaviors, which allows them more access to community-based work or residential settings.

This workshop delves into the complexities of emotional engagement for students in alternative high schools and those on the autism spectrum. It acknowledges the unique challenges these students face in connecting with peers, teachers, the curriculum, and school in general.

The session also explores strategies to create emotionally safe learning environments. This includes fostering positive teacher-student relationships, building social-emotional learning (SEL) skills, promoting peer interaction, and decreasing exclusionary discipline.

By the end of the session, participants will have a deeper understanding of emotional engagement and be equipped with practical tools to create learning environments where all students, regardless of background or neurodiversity, feel valued, understood, and motivated to learn.

Driving Results with CARS (Comprehensive Analysis, Response, & Support) Team visits

This session will detail how one regional cooperative uses a Comprehensive Analysis, Response, and Support (CARS) visit to provide schools with a "critical friend" viewpoint of the life of the school and determine resources to support continuous improvement. The CARS review provides the school and district administrators with critical feedback for school improvement in areas including climate/culture, academics & instruction, and leadership.

Each CARS team is comprised of specialists in general education, special education, and counseling/social-emotional learning, as well as experienced administrators. The visits allow CKEC the opportunity to consider how we might best pool the knowledge, skills, and resources of our staff to provide streamlined support to the school.

In the past two school years, we have visited nearly 40 schools and around 1000 classrooms. We have 3 guiding questions: 1) What are common needs across schools in our region? 2) What are specific issues within each school that, if addressed, might lead to increased outcomes for the school? 3) How might CKEC support schools in addressing those needs?

We will share our process, which includes data review, on-site visit, team debrief, presentation of findings, and follow-up. Additionally, participants will hear success stories about schools that participated, consider how CARS visits can support the mission of their organization, and reflect on lessons learned as the process has been refined.

Pioneering Futures in Education: California's School Counselor Residency Program

School counselors are integral to the education system, playing a crucial role in ensuring the academic, social, and emotional well-being of students. Through ongoing professional development, school counselors continually enhance their skills to better meet the diverse needs of students throughout their careers.

California is the first state to offer a residency program for school counselors. The California Center on Teaching Careers' School Counselor Residency (SCR) project is an induction program designed to enhance school counseling graduate students' transition from pre-service to employability.

The SCR project supports candidates from Fresno Pacific University's School Counseling program as they gain field experience in public schools and work toward their Pupil Personnel Services Credential in School Counseling. Research shows that school counselors affect school outcomes positively, which is why the Center has stepped up its efforts to recruit, develop support systems for, and retain a diverse workforce of school counselors who reflect the communities they serve. By providing both on-the-job training and financial incentives for program participants, the SCR project is reimagining the landscape of education service agencies.

School-based Health Services in Rural Communities

Elma Elementary School, located in Elma, Washington has over 750 students (preschool – 5th grade). Over 75% of the students qualify for free or reduced-price lunch and 12% of students are English language learners. The school district data is newer than the census data and the demographic breakdown suggests a more diverse younger population and a communities changing demographics. The Elma Elementary School-based Health Center (SBHC) Consortium is supported by the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) under the Rural Health Care Services Outreach Grant Program. The Elma Elementary SBHC is also supported by our consortium of local health care providers. Services include preventive medical, dental, vision, and mental health.

The program started in 2021 and is in its third year of operations. The program's goals include: Expand and support daily health care services to Elma Elementary School; Deliver daily health care services through consortium members actively involved and engaged in program planning and delivery; Employ evidence-informed models in the delivery of health care services to Elma Elementary; Demonstrate improved health and academic outcomes and program sustainability annually. At the end of year two of the program, the consortium had served 156 unique students, developed important relationships, and learned many valuable lessons to implementing school-based health in rural communities.

Supporting Parents in the World of Social Media

It becomes more apparent every year that social media is resulting in both personal mental health challenges for students and at the same time, negatively impacting school climate and culture.

The Social Balance is an evidence-based program being implemented by EdAdvance (the ESA of western CT) through a federal mental health grant to address this epidemic. Students and teachers go through a series of activities that encourage critical thinking when engaging with social media while learning about topics such as dopamine, algorithms, and the science of FOMO.

The Prevention of K-12 Student Online Exploitation and Child Trafficking: Improving the health, safety, and wellness of all learners.

There is an enemy hidden in plain sight, tearing at the social fabric of every nation, country, and city. During the pandemic, students across America received online academic instruction from their homes. Students attempted to stay socially connected to the outside world through social media and online gaming. A vast number of students lack the skills and tools to protect themselves against the barrage of online sexual content and the manipulative schemes of both in-person and online predators. According to the FBI, there are over 500,000 daily online predators seeking out children to sexually exploit them. In 2022, Grant Public Schools piloted a K-12 Human Trafficking Education Curriculum. Last January, after attending a grooming lesson, a 16-year-old female student thought she was being trafficked by a 30-year-old man from Pennsylvania. During the investigation, the School Resource Officer and local law enforcement discovered that the predator planned to travel to Michigan to meet the student at her school. The predator was apprehended by the FBI and law enforcement at the Gerald R. Ford Airport in Grand Rapids. Our interactive and engaging PowerPoint presentation demonstrates 1) An awareness of the nature and prevalence of online exploitation and child trafficking, and 2) How it can be mitigated through prevention education that is designed to equip children with the skills and tools to protect themselves from online sexual exploitation and human trafficking.

Taking ESA Leadership Actions that Support Legislated Opportunities for School Districts

Change is coming to public education and perhaps to Intermediate Units (IUs) in Pennsylvania. This ESA Talk session will describe how a February 2024 landmark Commonwealth Court decision that found the state's school funding unconstitutional is providing the IU with opportunities for leading meaningful change in school districts.

Reality of remedies mean more than \$4 billion may be required to adequately fund the state system of public education. Numerous legislators do not see more money alone as the remedy. Legislation changed school code to give school districts more flexibility. No longer is the requirement of a school year to be 180 days AND 900/990 hours, but can be 180 days OR 990/900 hours. AIU8 conducted a one-day Innovation Summit for leadership teams from the IU's 35 school districts to explore three key strategies for flexible school scheduling: (1) 4-day school week, (2) year-round schooling, and (3) competency-based education. National experts presented, then AIU8 leadership facilitated and recorded round-table discussions of district leaders discussing implementation challenges and opportunities. Follow-up action included AIU8 hosting a PA DOE official in a live, interactive webinar with district superintendents. The official explained the change in the school year code and opportunities afforded in flexibility. This recorded session, posted on the IU website, became a key resource for districts. Leadership matters and the future role of the IU is evolving.

Grow Your Own: Teacher Residency Pathways to Support and Develop Homegrown Educator Talent

The California Center on Teaching Careers (the Center) works to combat the current teacher shortage, particularly through the recruitment of ethnically diverse/bilingual math, science, and special education teachers.

Teachers of color often serve as mentors and role models for students of similar backgrounds, resulting in better academic outcomes. Yet a recent National Education Association Survey revealed that Latinx educators were more likely to quit teaching earlier than expected due to poor working conditions or lack of support. As a result, the Center has stepped up its efforts to recruit a teacher workforce that is representative of its student population.

Through its Teacher Residency for Rural Education (TRRE) Project, the Center supports graduate students seeking to obtain a single subject credential with a focus in STEM while earning a Master's degree in Education with an emphasis in curriculum & instruction.

Teacher residency programs allow program participants to work side-by-side with their teacher-mentor in the classroom as they gradually learn to plan lessons and support students throughout the school year. The TRRE project is supported by California's Statewide Residency Technical Assistance Center (SRTAC), which provides expert advice and assistance to program leaders within local education agencies.

This session will highlight early results and benefits of teaching residency programs, including a living stipend and supplemental income for participants.

Leading for Well-Being: How Teacher Mentors in Linn Benton Lincoln ESD are Leading the Charge to Improve Educator Well-being

Burnout is not inevitable. And Education Service Agencies are uniquely positioned to lead the charge for improvements in educator well-being.

Come learn how Linn Benton Lincoln Education Service District (LBL ESD) has implemented a research-backed professional learning program centered on improving educator well-being.

Initial empathy interviews during the 2021-22 school year surfaced challenges among LBL ESD-based novice educators in terms of their social and emotional well-being. Stress was ubiquitous. People were overwhelmed. In response, the LBL ESD launched a professional learning program centered on mentors to provide participants with opportunities to learn about, practice with, and apply strategies empirically proven to increase well-being. Participants learn about research-based methods for prioritizing what matters most, understanding and using their strengths, developing habits, setting boundaries, managing their time, engaging in difficult conversations, and more. Educators in the program have reported reductions in burnout and anxiety along with improvements in workplace well-being.

Participants at our conference session will learn about the 5 most common pitfalls leading to teacher burnout and gain granular insight into the multi-year well-being support program LBL ESD has constructed for teacher mentors. Participants will emerge with I-can-use-this-tomorrow strategies and clear next steps to embed well-being supports into existing programmatic structures.

Minnesota Education Policy Fellowship - Building Systems change through Policy Leadership

Far too often our systems of schools are drowning in solutions and initiatives that are in search of a problem. Shifting the mental model to use the policy design process - by first identifying the root problem before any solution is applied - can functionally shift the trajectory towards success in systems of school. The Minnesota Education Policy Fellowship (MN EPF) is a partnership between Lakes Country Service Cooperative, BrightWorks Service Cooperative and the Center for Policy Design that provides a year-long fellowship experience to school leaders of all types. MN EPF has a 45 year history in Minnesota and evolved into the service cooperative structure in the past five years. The fellowship hones in on education policy and its intersection with the state and federal political system so fellows have a much clearer understanding of how the proverbial “sausage gets stuffed” and where the levers of influence are within the education policy ecosystem.
